

## **WHY DO WE OFFER MASSES FOR THE LIVING AND DECEASED?**

**Mass intentions apply the special fruit (fructus specialis) of the Eucharistic Sacrifice to a specific person or intention, channeling its infinite value for spiritual benefits like impetration (graces for needs), propitiation (forgiveness of sins), and satisfaction (remission of temporal punishment).**<sup>1</sup> This holds for both living and deceased, rooted in the Mass's threefold fruits—general (for the whole Church), special (for the intention), and personal (for the celebrant)—which operate *ex opere operato*.<sup>1</sup>

### **The Fruits of the Mass: Infinite Efficacy**

The Sacrifice of the Mass yields **unlimited fruits**, not divided among participants but fully efficacious for each intention.<sup>1</sup>

The greater or less measure of the fruits derived will naturally depend very much on the personal efforts and worthiness... but... from the unlimited treasures of the Mass much more grace will result to the individual from a service participated in by a full congregation.<sup>1</sup>

- **General fruit (fructus generalis):** Benefits all humanity, including conversion of sinners.<sup>1</sup>
- **Special fruit (fructus specialis or ministerialis):** Directed by the priest to the **specific intention**, infallible when applied.<sup>1</sup>
- **Personal fruit:** For the celebrant.<sup>1</sup>

These effects are **impetratory** (petition for needs), **propitiatory** (for sins), and **satisfactory** (for punishments), applicable to living and dead.<sup>1</sup> Faithful historically offered alms so priests would apply the Mass "**for their intentions**."<sup>2</sup>

### **Benefits for the Living**

For living persons, a Mass intention procures:

- **Spiritual graces:** Forgiveness of venial sins, growth in virtue, strength against temptation.<sup>1</sup>
- **Temporal aids:** Protection, healing, success in endeavors, as the impetratory effect appeals to God's goodness.<sup>1</sup>
- **Participation in communion:** Enhances unity in Christ's Body, fostering devotion.<sup>1</sup>

The priest announces intentions in the **Prayer of the Faithful**, uniting the assembly's petitions.<sup>3</sup>

### Benefits for the Deceased

For the deceased (especially in purgatory), it offers **suffrage**—relief from purification:

- **Propitiatory and satisfactory effects:** Remits temporal punishments, hastens release to heaven.<sup>1 4</sup>
- **Impetratory graces:** Eternal rest, light, peace ("PAX TIBI," "ÆTERNA LUX TIBI").<sup>4</sup>

The Church offers the Eucharistic Sacrifice... for the dead so that... the petition for spiritual help on behalf of some may bring comforting hope to others.<sup>5</sup>

The Mass is the **most efficacious prayer** for the dead, integral to the communion of saints, where the living aid the suffering through sacrifice.<sup>4</sup> Early acclamations like "SPIRITUS TUUS IN BONO" express this.<sup>4</sup>

In essence, a Mass intention draws from Christ's infinite merits, aiding the living in sanctification and the dead in beatitude, strengthening the Church's mystical bonds.<sup>1 4</sup>
